Historically chief financial officers in community mental health have been responsible for managing the “debits and credits” of the organization, ensuring that the bills are paid, good financial controls are in place, and adequate funds are available to meet the agency’s total financial requirements. CFOs in today’s environment have an expanded role that includes being the “point person” for creating a culture of measurement and ensuring clinical/financial integration throughout the organization.

This institute, designed for current and prospective CFOs, is organized around the “5 hats” a CFO needs to wear, providing a comprehensive framework for managing an organization and dozens of concrete suggestions and tips.

During this institute participants will:

- Learn about a comprehensive annual planning model that includes projecting patient demand and utilization estimates along with revenue and expense projections.
- Identify the financial and non-financial activities that should be part of a CFO’s annual calendar.
- Explore the types of quantitative reports that should be made available to clinicians, managers, and executives in the organization.
- Develop strategies to promote clinical/financial integration including getting clinical staff engaged in financial and data analysis and to increasing the clinical understanding of financial staff.

#101—Why I Can't Sleep At Night: Current Compliance Issues

The Deficit Reduction Act of 2005 added a new provision requiring entities receiving over \$5M in Medicaid funds annually to implement policies regarding state and federal false claims acts and associated whistleblower protections. The fact that these policies apply not only to employees but also to contractors adds to the implementation challenges, especially in the absence of state Medicaid guidance. #3001—New Developments in Community Based Treatment of Methamphetamine Addiction

In many communities across the nation and especially in rural western regions, the increase in the use of methamphetamine has created almost hysteric reactions that may not always match the extent of the problem itself. In addition, these responses don't necessarily aid in the development of what should actually be done to help people who are addicted to meth. This six hour training is designed to present an innovative community based treatment model for methamphetamine addiction. The "Delta" model was started in Colorado and has been receiving national attention for its simplicity and its applicability in a variety of communities including those in rural areas with limited resources. Principles from the Delta model can be applied to the treatment of other community health concerns as well.

Nicolas Taylor, PhD, CAC III, Montrose, CO, is a Licensed Clinical Psychologist and a Level III Certified Addictions Counselor. He has specialized in substance abuse treatment since 1997 and is the author and program developer of the biopsychosocial model for treating addiction to methamphetamine. For six years he has been actively involved in regional and national efforts to improve community responses to meth addiction and he is well recognized as one of the nation's top presenters on the treatment of substance abuse issues.



#3002—Snatching Victory From the Jaws of Defeat: Improving the Outcome of Your Most Challenging Cases

Treatment Failures. Every therapist encounters them. Few books, scholarly articles, or workshops focus on identifying and preventing their occurrence. Although actually small in number, available evidence indicates that such cases accumulate on clinicians' caseloads and account for 60-70% of expenditures in behavioral health. In this workshop, participants will learn a simple and practical method for identifying cases at risk for failure early in the treatment process. Results from a number of clinical trials show that using the approach reduces drop out rates by half while improving the outcomes of the most challenging cases by 65%.

Educational Objectives:

1. Therapists will learn a single common pathway that accounts for most drop out and poor treatment outcomes;
2. Therapists will learn a simple and valid method for identifying people at risk for drop out or poor treatment response;
3. Therapists will learn three empirically supported strategies for improving the outcome of people at risk for drop out or poor outcome.

Scott D. Miller, PhD, Chicago, IL, is a therapist, lecturer and trainer on client-directed, outcome-informed clinical work and other time-sensitive therapeutic approaches. For 3 years he co-directed Problems to Solutions, Inc., a clinic specializing in the treatment of the homeless and other traditionally under served populations. Most recently, Dr. Miller co-founded the Institute for the Study of Therapeutic Change and works pro-bono at the clinic dedicated to serving the under served.



#3003—Integrating the Treatment of Mental Health and Substance Abuse in Adolescents

Dr. Riggs and her adolescent clinical research team at the University of Colorado School of Medicine have developed a practical implementation model of integrated treatment for co-occurring disorders based on recent advances in adolescent treatment research, including results from their recently completed and ongoing controlled clinical trials.

Dr. Riggs will present the developmental and treatment research on which the model is based, as well as outcomes from three “adoption” models adapted for implementation in three very different “real world” treatment settings. Expert clinician and national trainer, Ms. Connie Klein will join Dr. Riggs during Part II of the Workshop. Ms. Klein will conduct a basic skills training in the manualized cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT) which serves as the “backbone” psychosocial/behavioral treatment component of the integrated treatment model. The individual, weekly CBT primarily focuses on the treatment of substance abuse but can be flexibly adapted for use with other treatment modalities (e.g., family therapy) and/or pharmacotherapeutic/medication management to address common co-occurring psychiatric disorders including depression, anxiety, ADHD, and conduct disorder.

The workshop will conclude with an interactive group discussion of adaptations of the model for implementation in different treatment settings.

Paula Riggs, MD, Associate Professor of Psychiatry, UCDHSC, Denver, CO is a physician and clinical researcher who is board certified in adult, child and adolescent psychiatry with added qualifications in addiction psychiatry. Her research has primarily focused on the evaluation and treatment of adolescent substance abuse disorder (SUD) and associated comorbid disorders, such as conduct disorder (CD), affective disorders and attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD).
